Show, Not Tell in Year 5 – becoming better story writers

Learning this term Doing everything in love, go and do likewise.

Our pupils are enjoying their learning in all areas of the curriculum. The class pages on the school website give parents and carers information on the areas of learning covered every term. This information can be found by selecting the 'Classes' tab and navigating to the correct class using the pop-up menu.

Our Reception classes will continue to follow the early years framework and over the next few weeks this half term will be finding out about different

habitats, looking at a at simple animal life cycle and exploring the season of Winter. Year 1 will be learning about Wonderful Water and about birds, whilst investigating the properties of different materials. The pupils will learn about Antarctica, its animals and

significant explorers of the region. Year 2 will be learning about the Great Fire of London and the world that we live in. They will also be reading Gregory Cool by Caroline Binch to identify the 4-part plot and retell the story in the correct sequence. Year 3 will be learning about Living and Growing, thinking about plants as well as animals, including humans. Year 4 will be thinking about the legacy of the Vikings and the Ancient Greeks. They will also learn how both civilisations influenced our society and the impact they made to life today. Year 5 will learn about Crime and punishment.



This is set to be quite a 'gory' topic and not one for those a little 'squeamish'! Year 6 will be learning how they can make a difference, jetting off to South America, learning about conservation through examination of the different biomes that exist there and looking at how

economic activity impacts our world and habitats. A fantastic array of learning going on!

We continue to develop our curriculum offer, to ensure that that it gives our children a wide range of interesting learning and discovery, developing planning of historical enquiry, focusing on enquiry-based questions to develop children's understanding of significance, cause/consequence, continuity/change, and using evidence to support understanding.

Changes to the self-isolation period for those who test positive for COVID-19

This change came into effect in England on Monday 17th January 2022 and applies to all positive cases, regardless of vaccination status.

People who are self-isolating with COVID-19 have the option to reduce their isolation period after 5 full days if they test negative with an LFD test on both Day 5 and Day 6 and they do not have a temperature. For example, if they test Negative on the morning of Day 5 and the morning of Day 6, they can return to their education or childcare setting immediately on Day 6.

The first test must be taken no earlier than Day 5 of the self-isolation period, and the second must be taken the following day. All test results should be reported to NHS Test and Trace.

If the result of either test is positive, people should continue to self-isolate until there are negative results from two LFD tests on consecutive days or until completion of 10 full days of self-isolation, whichever is earliest.

Anyone who is unable to take LFD tests or anyone who continues to have a temperature will need to complete the full 10-day period of self-isolation.
